Rabbi Marc's Message

Dear Chaverim/Friends,
As I write this bulletin article, it is mid-August. I am just back from Cincinnati where my son Aaron and I led the

Shabbat morning service at Hebrew Union College -Jewish Institute of Religion when he became a bar mitzvah. On Friday night, I joined colleagues and friends for Shabbat evening services at Wise Temple in the Amberley Village neighborhood of Cincinnati. After a late Shabbat dinner, we talked long into the night, catching up with old friends. As my head hit the pillow, I wondered about what it would be like to bless Aaron on the bimah in the Scheuer Chapel where I have had so many meaningful moments. The following morning was gorgeous. Aaron was my flawless co-pilot on the bimah. He didn't miss a beat. He read Torah beautifully and gave a beautiful d'var Torah. He let his mother and I cry all we wanted and I think he might have shed a tear too. It was truly one of the most moving experiences of my life.

After celebrating in the early afternoon with friends, I began to catch up on what was happening in the world. In preparation for the bar mitzvah, to be totally present for Aaron, I had tuned the world out. Tuning back in, I was horrified to hear reports, read articles, and watch videos of the situation in Charlottesville, Virginia. My lifetime has not been devoid of tragedies and trying events: 9/11; the massacre at my alma mater, Virginia Tech; riots in my adopted hometown of Cincinnati; wars in Iraq and Afghanistan; many acts of terrorism at home and abroad. The videos out of

Charlottesville stunned me.

I am young enough that I did not live through the civil rights era. My generation and those younger than me are the beneficiaries of the struggle of many that came before us. Those generations sacrificed, suffered, and even gave their lives for the ideas of equality and justice that have been enshrined in our Constitution and preached by our prophets, both biblical and modern. When I witnessed via video neo-Nazi groups marching with torches across the campus of the University of Virginia I wondered just how far we've come. As I listened to the chant, "You won't replace us! -Jews won't replace us!" I could not help but feel personally threatened, that we hadn't come as far as we'd hoped. Those torch lights are still burning in my mind.

We are in the month of Elul, the month of preparation for the High Holy Days, seeking ways to make t'shuvah, a turning. During this time, we are taking stock of where we've been, where we are, and where we're going. Southeastern Connecticut is a beautiful place and a beautiful community. I am grateful to be here preparing for the High Holy Days at Temple Emanu-El. I am grateful that our community is far removed from centers of conflict. However, the insulation of our geography should not keep us from being in conversation, taking actions, participating in organizing efforts to help make our world more just, more peaceful, and more equitable. We are taught, , צדק צדק תרדוף, Tzedek Tzedek Tirdof – Justice, Justice, you shall pursue! It is not just a statement, but rather an imperative. An imperative that implies not only creating justice at home, but working for justice beyond the boundaries of our homes, sanctuaries,

and communities. Our world is far from perfect, maybe even a little less perfect than I'd hoped. More reason to use this time before the High Holy Days to do a *cheshbon hanefesh*, a true accounting of the soul. With that accounting and following it with action, may our world move a little closer to that peaceful, beautiful, idyllic world Aaron and I shared on Shabbat morning.

I've had the rest of the summer to clean the garage, paint the deck, get the kayak in the water, and to submit my Gift of the Heart form to the Temple office. Now I look at the calendar and it's already the middle of August, and I've still got a lot of work to do. Don't worry though, I'm going to retain my Temple membership.

I encourage everybody to spend some time thinking about what Temple Emanu-El means to you when you fill out your Gift of the Heart pledge. The majority of our budget is based on your generosity. Rabbi Ekstrand, Sherry Barnes, the Board, the Hebrew School, and I have worked hard to make the Temple worthy of your support. Your support will ensure that our congregation remains strong, active, and vibrant.

As we get ready to enter the year 5778, I worry that our congregation might be procrastinating. We find our broader Jewish Community is in flux. The sale of Beth El's building puts a lot of pressure on us. We have happily welcomed Solomon Schechter into our building – by the time you read this, SSA's first school year at Emanu-El will have started. We are working on plans to have Beth El rent our sanctuary when we're not using it. While I'm thrilled that our building is be-

coming the center of the Jewish community of Southeastern Connecticut, I worry that while our congregation is strong, our building might not be big enough to meet the new usage that we're accepting.

We're holding our own as a congregation, but the community as a whole continues to shrink. Like the rest of the community, we rely on outside resources, like renters, to make ends meet. Now that Beth El is selling its building, our neighboring congregations are looking to us for our support and leadership. The challenge that faces us this year is to determine in what way we are going to provide that leadership. Are we going to be landlords? Or are we interested in participating in re-imaging our community's appearance into something new? Are we going to procrastinate and wait for decisions to be forced upon us? Or are we going to apply our energy and focus on shaping those decisions? I don't pretend to know the right answer, but I want to hear what you think is right for us. I look forward to seeing all of you during the High Holidays as we begin to explore the new challenges of 5778.

"May the time not be distant, our G-d, when all shall turn to You in love, when corruption and evil shall give way to integrity and goodness, when lies and bigotry shall no longer enslave the mind, nor idolatry blind the eye. So may all, created in Your image, become one in spirit and one in friendship..."

These words are adapted from Rabbi Chaim Stern and should sound familiar to you. You can find them in our prayer books, Gates of Prayer, Gates of Repentance, Mishkan T'filah, and our new machzor, Mishkan Hanefesh.

I've read these words many times, but today they came alive on the page and spoke loudly to with me. The ideal world where we "become one in spirit and one in friendship..." how does that day even happen? Can it really happen? Could I even imagine how it would look? It would be wonderful if everyone respected each other, helped each other, and loved each other. But how do we get there? It seems like such a huge task.

Outside Rabbi Ekstrand's office are the words of Rabbi Tarphon," You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to abandon it." We may not be able to

make this dream of peace happen over night, but if each of us saw the divine in each other that spark of G-d that connects all of us, maybe we could begin to silence hatred, bigotry, and racism, and begin to heal. We can certainly speak out against hatred, racism, and anti-Semitism in peaceful protesting, but I think the best way is by getting to know people and letting them get to know you.

As we prepare for the High Holy Days, we will be using a new book, Mishkan HaLev, A Sanctuary for the Heart, for the month of Elul. Rabbi Jack Riemer writes: "Turning does not come easily... It means breaking with old habits. ... It means recognizing that we are able change. These things are terribly hard to do. But unless we turn, we will be trapped forever in yesterday's ways. G-d, help us to turn from callousness to sensitivity, from hostility to love, from pettiness to purpose, from envy to contentment ... from fear to faith. Turn us around and bring us back toward each other – for in isolation there is no life."

Shanah Tovah. To a good year, a year of peace.

Temple Emanu-El Religious School staff has been busy all summer as we were preparing to welcome Solomon Schechter Academy to our school building. Solomon Schechter Academy will be holding a full-day program in our Religious School this year. To make this possible it has taken a major amount of work organizing, clearing and storing much of our equipment as we make room for all of the Schechter equipment and supplies.

We thank our teachers and members of our Temple community for stepping up and helping to make this happen.

As we are attempting to fit into our new space and still create an atmosphere that our school is still ours we ask for everyone's understanding and patience. Change can be a challenge. It will be helpful to us if you **put your children's names in coats, hats, sweaters etc.** as well as any other items which they might bring in. It can be hard for us to identify whose belongings were left behind. We need to be able to distinguish which items belong to Temple Emanu-El Religious School students and which items belong to SSA students.

We will be welcoming two **new Israeli emissaries who will be working with us. Ziv Lavi and Sivan Gvili** should be ready to join us at the beginning of our year. It is our hope that they will help us with our conversational Hebrew as well as sharing their knowledge of Israeli culture and history. It is such a positive experience to have the emissaries in our classrooms.

In response to the surveys that were collected in the spring, and the group meetings that many of you attended, we will be attempting to incorporate some of the ideas that were generated. **Many of you expressed a desire to be room parents** and filled that out on your registration forms. We have gathered those names and you will be contacted right after school begins to see how you might be of help.

It was also suggested that we use a **Remind App to notify parents of school cancellations and important events.** We will be working on setting that up and will let you know when we have started to use it. Only those of you who sign up to use this will receive notifications. More information will follow. Please note that we will only use it for major announcements as while it is a good thing, many also find it annoying if it is overused. We will still e-mail and send notices for many of our events.

There will not be any Midweek Hebrew on Wednesday, September 20, as we observe Erev Rosh Hashanah. We hope to see our children at Rosh Hashanah services on Thursday, September 21. We encourage families with younger children to attend the children service at 2:00 P.M. It will be followed by Taschlich.

Yom Kippur is on Saturday, September 30. **Our children's Yom Kippur service will be at 2:00 PM.** We will not have Religious School on Sunday, October 1, so families can enjoy the holiday weekend together.

Hello Brothers,

I am excited to take on my new role as Brotherhood President. By the time you read this, hopefully I reached out to you to discuss our regular programs and thoughts for new activities.

We have an upcoming sukkah build on **Sunday, October 1**. I was hoping to add some pizzaz this year, so I took a look at the sukkah regulations (which are worse than building and zoning rules) to see if we can do something different. It turns out that the aluminum frame we have out all year awaiting decoration (thank you, Alvin Sher) is Kosher.

Sukkah regulation number 1 states:

A sukkah must be built anew every year for the purpose of the mitzvah. This requirement, however, applies only to the sechach (roof), since it is the sechach that makes the sukkah a sukkah. Thus, one can leave the walls standing all year, and place the roof covering before the festival. If the sukkah and the sechach have been up all year, one can simply lift up and replace the sechach, which allows the sukkah to be considered as new.

But sukkah regulation number 2, we've been skirting for many years.

The walls of a sukkah can be made of any material, provided that they are sturdy enough that they do not move in a normal wind. You can use wood or fiberglass panels, water-proof fabrics attached to a metal frame, etc. You can also use pre-existing walls (i.e., the exterior walls of your home, patio or garage) as one or more of the sukkah walls. An ex-

isting structure that is roofless or has a removable roof can also be made into a sukkah by covering it with proper sechach.

So our plastic mesh walls, while sturdy, I'm not sure they are actually walls. We may need to apply for a zoning variance. Or... let's build some walls! I'd like to hear from you on creative wall building. Wood? Cardboard with shellac? Canvas pulled tight? Really big movie screens so we can have a brotherhood movie in the sukkah?

As for the roof, I think we've been pretty good at that regulation.

Sukkah regulation number 3:

- The sukkah needs to be covered with sechach—raw, unfinished vegetable matter. Common sukkah roof-coverings are bamboo poles, evergreen branches, reeds, corn stalks, narrow strips (1×1 or 1×2) of unfinished lumber, or special sechach mats (which I don't seem to have just lying around my place).
- Mats made of bamboo, straw or other vegetable matter can be used only if they were made for the purpose of serving as a roof covering.

The sechach must be detached from its source of growth—thus a live trellis, or branches still attached to a tree, cannot be used.

I look forward to seeing you on the 1st for the build!

Social Action

As we enter a New Year, the Social Action Committee is reassessing its goals and trying to remain relevant in its target areas: The Temple Community, the Eastern Connecticut Community, and Israel.

A few things that deserve mention:

1. **The Mitzvah Corps**—A goal before the end of the calendar year is to have the Mitzvah Corps more effectively address the needs of Temple members. The Mitzvah Corps is focused on the immediate, often emergency and usually short -term needs of Temple members.

We have made efforts over time to make the Mitzvah Corps more known and more effective with limited success. It is necessary during the next few months to better organize and with determination make the Mitzvah Corps an effective resource for the entire Temple community.

- 2. **Mitzvah Day**—We have changed our approach from one annual Mitzvah Day that attempted to encompass many aspects of local needs and community organizations, to a Day, four times a year, which addresses primarily one target problem/concern. Our next Mitzvah "Day" is tentatively scheduled for October 29 dealing with "Cleanup" both of the Temple and our grounds as well as other identified community cleanup projects.
- 3. The Changes that are coming. As Solomon Schechter relocates and as Beth-El goes through their move, there are likely situations and even projects that might be appropriate for Social Action involvement. Our availability for such involvement should be made known to the Temple Community and the Community at large.
- 4. Our Core Projects:
- **a. Soup Kitchen:** We prepare a meal, from soup to nuts, for the Community Meals Center in New London on the third Tuesday of every month. If interested in becoming involved, please contact Hali Keeler.
- **b. Habitat for Humanity:** We combine with Beth-El on one Sunday every month for a Sunday Build at a Rehab or New Construction site for Habitat for Humanity. If interested, contact Marty Zeldis. Our next Sunday Build is tentatively scheduled for September 10.
- **c. Start Fresh:** This is the local Refugee Program. Start Fresh is presently sponsoring three families in this area and is now taking on a fourth family. Meetings are every Thursday at the Crossroads Presbyterian Church in Waterford. The need for help is enormous. Anyone interested should contact Karen Bloustine.


