# Rabbi Marc's Message

Ahhh...The High Holy Days have passed, Sukkot and Simchat Torah too. Sherry, the choir, Roberta and I get to breathe a deep breath and then get about the work we've been putting off since mid-summer

while we planned and prepared for our most sacred holidays and joyous festivals.

Preparing for the High Holy Days takes a tremendous amount of time for me. Each service that I conduct, whether it is for Shabbat, a festival, or the HHD's, is unique. I try to craft the liturgical experience to meet the demands of the day. When something happens in the world around us, if we can't be responsive with our liturgy, we have failed to meet your spiritual needs. This also holds true for my sermons and divrei Torah. I rarely give a sermon or d'var Torah that is simply an interpretation or analysis of the Torah text. Rather, I feel it is of utmost importance that I respond to the issues of our day through the lens of our Reform Jewish tradition.

If you attended all four High Holy Day services in which I gave a sermon, you heard four distinctly different messages: Reform values at Temple Emanu-El; community and modernity; racism; and opioid addiction. I also thank Rabbi Emeritus Aaron Rosenberg for his perspective on Jonah. You may not have liked every sermon, or maybe none of them. I don't expect everyone to agree with me or appreciate my perspective. The prophetic voices of our tradition motivate me in all that I do and say. I do sincerely hope that even if you didn't like my perspectives, that my sermons inspired some reflection upon your own views regarding the subjects I chose. If at least that happened, I think I accomplished a great deal. From there, I hope we can have conversations that lead to greater understanding of the important issues that we face in our community.

Temple Emanu-El is a vibrant community. This vibrancy comes through the variety of things going on here - Religious School, Brotherhood, Sisterhood, Social Action, education opportunities, collaboration with the Jewish Federation, Jewish Community High School, Hadassah, SSA, and others. The opportunity for all of us to come together as one community is Shabbat. This year we will continue what we started last year with highlighting First Fridays. The First Friday of each month, we will have a communal evening which is for the entire Emanu-El community. It begins at 5:30 with a Tot Shabbat geared toward our youngest community members up to 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and their families. This is followed by a communal Shabbat dinner at 6 P.M. This is a catered dinner at a nominal cost, \$18 for adults and \$5 for ages 13 and under. Every Shabbat meal has been very good and worth that cost – let alone that you get to share a Shabbat table with old and new friends. This year Sherry and I will conclude the dinner hour leading a few zimirot, songs to celebrate Shabbat. The evening Shabbat service begins at 7 P.M. followed by Kiddush and Oneg Shabbat at about 8:15. If you have children in the  $3^{rd}$  grade and up, I encourage you to bring them to the 7 P.M. service. An hour and fifteen minutes might be a lot at first for the younger kids but as you and they join in our worship through song and verse, the time will go by quickly. The vibrancy of our community begins with you. There is truly something for everyone on First Fridays. Please come join us any Shabbat, but particularly on First Fridays – be with friends, engage spiritually, and make new friends. I look forward to seeing you there.

# President's Message



I'm writing this on the second anniversary of the night that I took office as your president. It's a nice coincidence that my anniversary articles also get to be my Thanks-giving articles.

Last year I wrote about what it was like to sit on the Bimah during the High Holy Days. This year, I was

thinking about what it's like to stand there as I, along with my mentor and Past President, Gail Weber, had the honor of holding a Torah scroll during the recitation of Kol Nidre. Based on the comments I received after the service, most of you took this honor to be as much of a chore as an honor. The scroll is not light, and Kol Nidre is not short. People seemed to be concerned that holding the scroll for so long amounted to a physical ordeal, one worthy of sympathy. I'm writing tonight to tell you how special the experience was.

Don't get me wrong. There is a technique to holding the scroll. I grab the base of the scroll with my right hand and then grab my right wrist with my left hand. Then I kind of hang the back of the scroll on my belt. Sorry, Gail, I do get that one extra advantage with my wardrobe. Then I just settle in, wondering how long the ceremony would take. As the music started, though, I was surprised to find that I quickly began not to think of the scroll as an object, but as a living thing – one that was supporting me while I was supporting it.

I held the Torah like it was one of my children, afraid to drop it. I held the Torah like it was my wife, slowly swaying to the music that was being played. I reflected on the words in it. Like my parents and ancestors, those words tell us all that has ever been. Like my children and their children to come, those words tell us all that will ever be. I think about the ink on the pages. Each letter drawn by hand. Each letter a work of art by itself, but also uniting with the other letters to form a tapestry that is both visually striking and deeply spiritual, even if I don't take the time to read every word. I became lost in these thoughts while the music played, and was surprised and saddened when the music ended.

I've said before, and will say again, how truly thankful I've been to be honored by all of you with your trust of me. You've also put your faith in a terrific Board of Trustees – a group of dedicated people across all of our Temple demographics who will hold our congregation with love and tenderness, just as I got to hold our Torah.

and focus our time more on our Hebrew and Judaic studies. Our emissaries are going to be spending more time in individual classrooms, working on Modern Hebrew. We are hoping that the students will have an opportunity to become familiar with many Hebrew words and phrases and will get to use them in their classrooms. We encourage you, to spend some time using those words at home so that they will become familiar to everyone.

Although hurricane season seems to have been winding down, the many areas that were destroyed and heavily damaged by these storms are struggling to survive and rebuild. Our students have shown their concern by collecting weekly Tzedakah and supporting our eighth-grade basket raffle, the proceeds of which will go to help the people who are trying to recover.

**To date we have collected \$142 in Tzedakah.** There are two weeks left for our basket raffle, after the first day \$83 was collected. We will report our final totals in the December bulletin as well as where the money was sent. We thank everyone who has helped support this effort.

On October 15, Rabbi Marc and Cantor Sherry led a short service called Blessing the Animals. Many of our families,

with their pets, remained after Religious School as we participated in prayers and songs focusing on animals. Rabbi Marc spoke individually to each person or family who brought a pet to be blessed. We held this out by our Noah's Ark. It was a very moving and informative program for those who participated.

Our **Religious School Book Fair** is being held **Wednesday**, **November 1; Sunday, November 5; and Wednesday, November 8.** It is a chance for everyone to purchase both Judaic and secular books from the Scholastic Company. Although this is done as a service to our families, if it is well attended and we sell a good number of books, it turns into a fund-raiser for the Religious School. The focus is on children's books; however, there is usually a collection of adult books available.

Since we are unable to use the classroom we have previously used, the Book Fair is being set up on the open area in the sanctuary to the right when you come from the atrium. We would like to thank Thea Johnson and her committee for coordinating this event. We urge everyone to support this event. This is a chance to get your Chanukah shopping done early.

The Family Service on November 3 will have the 7th grade students participating. It begins with Tot Shabbat, followed by the Shabbat dinner and then the service. We look forward to seeing all of our Religious School families at this service.

I recognize that this isn't everyone's "cup of tea" and it shouldn't be, but not unlike the experiences of many of our parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents, these refugees have suffered and have worked hard to come to our community. **Start Fresh** is presently sponsoring four refugee families in the New London County area. The need for drivers, tutors, and advocates is great. There is also a thrill when a job is found, a needed class is successful, language skills are improved, or a driver's license is gotten. **Religious Practices** 

Many thanks to **Greg Morea** for his tireless and expert help in providing a lovely Break-the-Fast at Yom Kippur. Thank you also to the congregants who stepped up to help Greg in the kitchen throughout the day. Thank you to Janine Sitko, who helped in organizing the Break-the-Fast. And, thank you to all who brought food or contributed money toward purchasing food and to the Sisterhood for contributing toward the costs of the food.

And now, we need the congregation's participation for our Shabbat onegs. **Imagine not having our onegs!** We would attend the Shabbat service and have that special pause in our busy weeks that the hour or so of prayer, song, and Torah provides. We would sing our kiddush and motzi and then... leave.

When would we chat with our Temple friends? How would we welcome visitors? When would we ever introduce ourselves to that familiar face who is not yet our friend? How would we mark special occasions such as birthdays, anniversaries, and yahrzeits? Without our onegs, it wouldn't be a very beautiful welcome for Shabbat, and our Temple's reputation for being a warm and welcoming congregation would be diminished.

Although we are delighted to welcome Donna to our kitchen every Friday evening and look forward to having her help set up, maintain, and clear the onegs, the part that is missing is the **food**!

# **Communicating Done Right**

The Temple Emanu-El Communications Committee has been busy! The Committee first met in January and created a list of objectives and goals for 2017. Our main objectives were engagement (members) and outreach (non-members), to grow our congregation and involve those already affiliated with our Temple. We wanted to make sure people know we are a progressive & vibrant congregation.

#### How to get this done?

First we needed to know how people communicate so we could better relay information to our members. The committee put together a TEE Communications Survey, and with 148 responses, gained insight into how our congregation can stay connected, and the best ways to communicate with members of all ages. To see the survey results, go to the TEE Website and click the "And the Survey Says" box on the homepage. We found people really like the weekly e-mails from the Temple and that 96% read the Bulletin!

We have been transitioning to a new website design and have been updating content. Since beginning this process, we have heard from URJ (Union for Reform Judaism), who hosts our site, that they will be changing over to a different programing language, WordPress, which means our site design will be changing again over the next few months. We will continue to strive toward easier navigation and updated content as we work through these transitions. If we have a WordPress pro in our congregation, please let us know!

We created a brochure and rack card for prospective mem-

bers and for community outreach, and have updated the look of the Temple Bulletin, with a clean and informative approach. Keep an eye out for a fun trivia question included in the Bulletin each month!

The Communications Committee also put together a TEE Publicity Checklist. This list was distributed to all board members and committee heads, and contains contact information for those within the Temple, such as the website and bulletin liaisons, as well as within the community, such as local newspapers, to help committees to publicize an event.

And, we helped the TEE Religious School implement the Remind App, which is a texting app, that can be used to notify those who wish to receive the texts of important information such as school cancellations,
