Rabbi Marc's Message

In early December, Sherry Barnes and I were blessed to have attended the Union for Reform Judaism Biennial convention in Boston. The Biennial is a barometer of the strength of our movement and a map for

where we are going. Among the guest speakers were the Republican Governor of Massachusetts, Charlie Baker; Democrat Senator Elizabeth Warren; Civil Rights activist and organizer of the Moral Monday movement, Rev. Dr. William Barber II; the President of the Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism, Gilad Kariv; President of the URJ, Rick Jacobs, President of the Association of Reform Zionists of America (ARZA), Josh Weinberg – just to name a few. The bottom line is that our movement is stronger than ever both in North America and Israel and continues to grow in strength. Sherry and I witnessed how the movement is energized with serious scholarship, creative music and art, modern engaging liturgy, social action grounded by the work of the Religious Action Center (RAC), continuing and youth education development rooted in the work of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR), and the dynamic youth engagement program of the National Federation of Temple Youth (NFTY) instilling Jewish values in our tweens and teens to fight injustice, engage with Israel and build the next generation of Jewish leadership. I am grateful that Sherry and I have brought back so much of the energy of our movement but I do wish that Temple Emanu-El could have had more representation at the Biennial. In two years, come with us to Chicago!

As our community has gone through so much transition lately, it is easy to lose sight of our mission, "Building a vibrant community through Reform Judaism." Our recent efforts to integrate the Solomon Schechter Academy at our synagogue, to welcome Congregation Beth El for their Shabbat morning worship and other programs, and hosting the Kosher Hot Lunch, might lead one to believe that the Reform part of our mission has taken a back seat. While Temple Emanu-El strives to be a leader in shaping the future of the Jewish Community in Southeastern Connecticut, Reform must remain the core of who we are and the foundation of all we do.

My teacher, Rabbi Dr. Michael Marmur, professor and former Provost of HUC-JIR co-chaired a learning session regarding Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. Rabbi Marmur recently published a book, Abraham Joshua Heschel and the Sources of Wonder. What I learned in the introduction to his book is that Rabbi Marmur, like me, is inspired by the life and work of a man whom neither of us had the honor and pleasure to know personally. Rabbi Heschel's book, The Prophets, inspired me to leave corporate life and become a rabbi, not because I see myself as a prophet, but rather my desire to be part of a movement which looks at the world critically and acts accordingly to bring about a kinder and more just society. Indeed, it is the prophetic call to action that is the cornerstone of Reform Judaism.

In the crescendo of what I believe be the most important address of the URJ Biennial, Rev. William Barber starkly reminds us that those people whom we look to for inspiration, one among them Rabbi Heschel, are dead. Although prophets speak to us through the lens of history, they cannot lead us in our own time. Rather, the same prophetic message carried by Isaiah, Hosea, Ezekiel, Parks, King, Heschel, Ghandi and others is now in our hands to carry. Rabbi Marmur reminded us of Heschel's words from a telegram to JFK in 1963, "The hour calls for moral grandeur and spiritual audacity." These words still ring true today. How will I carry the prophetic message? How will you carry it?

The URJ is very involved in social justice issues, invests in our youth

with programming grounded in Jewish values, and works hard to keep meaningful, forward moving connections with Israel.

Some of the speakers the URJ chose for Biennial this year were Senator Elizabeth Warren, Governor Charlie Baker, and Rev. Dr. William J. Barber, all motivational speakers working to make a positive change in their lifetime.

The URJ acknowledges those who have raised their voices for those who may not have one, by presenting the Eisendrath Bearer of Light Award to people like Dr. Mona Hanna-Attisha who fought to be heard on behalf of the children of Flint, Michigan, who were being poisoned by the contaminated drinking water. What was most striking about Jody, beyond her fervor, commitment and dogged determination, is that she would consistently propose things that were off the Social Action beaten path, and then she would figure out ways to make these innovative ideas become reality and work well. ENRICHMENT COURSES (1st hour)

ANTI-SEMITISM IN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE with Rabbi Ken Alter and Daniel Robinson

This course will examine the history of anti-Semitism from the Greco-Roman period to the present. Among the subjects that will be covered: hostility to Judaism in the early Church, violence against Jews during the First Crusade, the growth of anti-Semitism in eastern Europe, and how hostility to Jews and Judaism changed as Europe moved into the Renaissance and the modern era. We will also look at the roots of anti-Semitism in the Muslim world and the current state of global anti-Semitism, including anti-Zionism, emanating from both the right and the left.

SCIENCE AND JUDAISM: HOW CAN THEY COEXIST AND INTERMIX IN THE 21ST CENTURY? with Rabbis Jeremy Schwartz and Julius Rabinowitz

Join us for a journey that will examine the respective roles that science and Judaism play in our lives, and how we can best respond to the intersections that arise between provable science and believable faith. We will look at excerpts from Biblical and historical Jewish texts as well as references from famous scientists as we explore the extent to which they agree or disagree.

NARRATIVES OF SLAVERY with Rabbi Marc Ekstrand

We will read together the popular book by reporters from the Hartford Courant, Complicity: How the North Promoted, Prolonged and Profited from Slavery. We will explore how our own Jewish narrative of slavery informs our reading of this book and how the stark realities of slavery inform our thinking about modern societal problems. This is an eye opening book with a narrative of slavery you will not have learned about in school. Please obtain a copy of the book and read the first two chapters before the first class. You may find the book in your local library or from your favorite bookseller.

WASHINGTON HEIGHTS, AKA "THE FOURTH REICH" with Artie Dean and Jerry Fischer

Washington Heights was a destination for Jews fleeing Germany, and was renowned for its delicatessens, synagogues, and notable graduates of George Washington High School, Yeshiva University, and City College. Films have been made about the neighborhood, books have been written.

Artie Dean and Jerry Fischer, two natives of Washington Heights, will share the history of that section of Manhattan, their own personal stories, and how the neighborhood has changed over the years in that bastion of northern Manhattan where Fort Tryon and revolutionary battles took place.

YOU BE THE JUDGE with Rabbi Avrohom Sternberg

"You Be the Judge" presents you with real cases brought before Beit Din, the court system of Jewish law. We provide the primary source texts from Talmud and put you in the driver's seat. You will have the opportunity to question, discuss, and argue, based on principle and precedent. You will experience firsthand the exhilarating mental exploration that characterizes traditional Talmud study.

COMMUNITY FORUMS (2nd hour)

Community Forums bring everyone together to hear a guest speaker/s. Topics for 2018 include Jews in the arts — music, art, theater and cinema. Look for details in the Jan. 5 Leader.
