Rabbi's Message -Marc Ekstrand

As you receive this Bulletin, we are well into the month of Cheshvan. The month is sometimes referred to as Mar-Cheshvan. Mar has a couple of meanings. It can be connected with the increasing

rains in Israel during this month. As it is stated in Isaiah 40:15, Chein goyim ki'mar mi'di'li, "the nations are but a drop in a bucket." But mar is more commonly understood to mean "bitter." Bitter, because this month lacks any festivals. Adding to this bitterness is that Cheshvan possibly should have had a festival of its own. It was in this month that King Solomon's workers completed the First Temple. The Temple was built of hewn stones, cedar and cypress planks, gold overlays, and magnificent bronze. The bronze-works were so large that they had to be cast in molds dug into the earth. It took seven years to complete the Temple and this was as much a regional effort as Israelite. Hiram, the Phoenician king of Tyre, offered his expert coppersmiths and eventually received the tribute, 20 towns in the Galilee in return.

The construction was completed in the month of *Cheshvan*. We must imagine that this was a joyous moment. Yet, the Temple was not dedicated then. Rather, it stood locked and empty for nearly a year until the next High Holy Festivals in the month of *Tishrei*, adding to that month's stature at the bitter expense of *Cheshvan*. Yet, after the Holy season, which stretches over two months, perhaps we need a month without a holiday. The sacred festivals really began with spiritual preparations back in the month of Elul and did

not end until Simchat Torah. We need a little time to regroup, recharge, recall our latke recipes and get ready for the Festival of Lights.

All the more so, the break in activity is an opportunity to reflect and give thanks. In some years when *Chanukah*, recalling the rededication of the Second Temple, is particularly late in our secular year, *Cheshvan* gains our national holiday of Thanksgiving. Although this occurs only a handful of times in the seventeen-year calendrical cycle, perhaps it gently reminds us of a theme this time of year. Our prayers direct us toward thankfulness, morning, noon and night. In the early morning it is a personal supplication, *modeh ani lifanecha*, "I give thanks to You," for the gift of my soul. By the time of the recitation of the Amidah, that theme of thankfulness transforms to the communal *modim anachnu lach*, "We thank You," not only for our lives and our souls but also for Your wondrous works and Your continuous compassion and lovingkindness.

Only one benediction follows in the 19 thrice-daily benedictions of the Amidah, and that benediction is for peace. Thus, thankfulness and peace are, by design, on our lips and in the forefront of our minds as we take leave of our prayer spaces and return to the places where our prayer really matters. The synagogue is our sacred space, our respite. However, the purpose of prayer is realized only outside of the temple where we transform prayer from thought to action. I suggest a mindset of thankfulness is the essential fuel for that action. This action, if our prayer has been focused, transforms our world from what it was and is, to what it can be – a righteous house of prayer for all people and a dwelling place worthy of God.

Notes from Sherry Barnes



Cantillation is the ritual chanting of sacred text from the Tanakh, Hebrew Bible. This is done with special markings called trope or in Hebrew, Ta-amei Hamikra, which means "taste" or "sense" of the writing. I learned to chant Torah in preparation for becom-

ing a Bat Mitzvah in May 1989. Learning to read Hebrew, chanting prayers, and writing my D'var Torah were all very fulfilling, but, as I have told many of my students, chanting Torah is the icing on the cake. Opening this sacred scroll, chanting its ancient text, like so many before me, was humbling and awe inspiring. I loved it so much that I came back to chant whenever I could.

The mention of chanting Torah goes back about 2,000 years. The creation of a notated system, known as trope, or cantillation marks, goes back to the 9th or 10th centuries C.E., with the most important being written by the Masorites. You may have noticed these trope marks when you've chanted the V'ahavta prayer in the siddur. You've already been chanting Torah and didn't know it! Since the Torah is a sacred text, we are not supposed to change one word, lest we change the meaning of the text. The trope marks help us do this by accenting the words correctly and serving as punctuation, which help preserve the interpretation of the text that has been accepted. Now that you have had a ta'am, a taste, of what chanting Torah is about, I hope you will join my class on Tuesday, Nov. 6, at 6:30. We will be working on Torah, Haftarah, Megillat Esther, and High Holy Day Torah trope, with a goal of chanting Torah on Shabbat, and a few sentences of Megillat Esther for Purim. Knowledge of reading Hebrew is necessary.

So, have you decided to participate this year in our 6th Annual Cabaret on Feb. 2? You still have time to decide; I'm just watering the seed I planted last month.;)

Have a wonderful Thanksgiving! May your tables be filled with good food, the love of family and friends, and abundant blessings.

The Temple's Mitzvah Corps is in place and ready to help. - 3. Habitat for Humanity. For nearly 20 years, the Temple has been involved with the local Habitat program in building homes for families in need. Over the years this has evolved to monthly Sunday Builds at an area Habitat site. After doing this on our own for several years, the Temple is now partnered with Beth-El as we make Habitat sites and houses into real live Homes. The November Build date and site location has not yet been an-

In order to provide meaningful help to all these entities, be it at the Temple, in the community, or for Israel, we need the involvement of many people. JFEC Missions to Israel — February & March 2019

Dear Emanu-El Member,

For 31 years, on almost an annual basis, the Jewish Federation of Eastern CT has run a Mission to Israel. They have been as small as 8 and as large as 48. In recent years participation has ranged from 12-20 people.

Many people have asked us to run a "more affordable" Mission, and this year we have found a way to do that. We will run an "ISRAEL ON A BUDGET" MISSION that is perfect for first-timers, interfaith couples, and even for returnees who have not been to Israel in the last 10 years. It will cost \$3,200 per person, double occupancy including airfare (Single supplement \$750). It departs Feb. 24 and returns March 7.

I will personally lead this trip. We will cover Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, Haifa, and the Galil, and will visit Afula and the Gilboa to have first-hand encounters with the programs the Jewish Federation supports and the people we work with.

There will also be a highly focused MISSION FEATUR-ING THE ART, CULTURE, CUISINE, ARCHEOLOGY, AND ARCHITECTURE OF ISRAEL that departs March 10 and returns March 21. The cost for that Mission is \$4,750 per person, double occupancy including airfare (Single supplement, \$990). It is an enhanced reprise of our first Mission like this which ran last March.

Both Missions offer optional extensions to Eilat (Bird Migration time); Eilat & Petra (Raiders of the Lost Ark); and Eilat, Petra and Wadi Rum (Lawrence of Arabia).

Feel free to ask Flossie Betten, Myra & Rick Gipstein, Sherry Barnes, Barbara & Scott Wolfe or many others in the Congregation about JFEC Missions. They will give you an honest appraisal of their experiences.


