On Sundays and Wednesdays, the normal entrance will be through the school atrium doors. Again, these doors will be locked, but manned. Please be patient if you have to wait a moment for entry, but I promise a friendly face will be there to greet you.

...I hope that an episode from this past weekend will not become a trend. During a vigil at NYU, attendees lashed out at none other than Chelsea Clinton, who was in attendance. All this time, I thought the struggle was to get people to feel empathy and compassion for others.
