



Rabbi's Message - Marc Ekstrand

Finally, after a long, rainy, cold spring, it seems summer is finally here. The trees are filled out with leaves, the insects are buzzing around the flowers, the warmth

of the sun feels so good. Our biblical tradition is replete with nature imagery. The opening chapters of Genesis paint God as the architect, master builder of our universe and everything in it. God uses nature to impress and assert power. God floods the world in response to disappointment in humanity, parts the sea to save the Israelites, makes manna fall like rain, and uses disease to punish. God is heard speaking calmly from the non-consuming flame of the burning bush, and bellowing from the heights of Mount Sinai. The Psalmist sees God behind everything and in everything.

*Adonai my God, You are grand indeed!
You are clothed in surpassing splendor –
Wrapping Yourself in light like a cloak,
Unwrapping the heavens like a curtain of smoke,
Laying the beams of Your upper chambers in the waters,
Turning Your clouds into Your chariot,
Walking about on the wings of the wind,
Making the winds Your messengers;
Flaming fire, Your ministers.*

God's power is manifest in the world we see around us. We may be awed by great expanses – the sea, the desert, the mountains; or things hidden from view – tiny subatomic particles or hints of faraway worlds. Most wondrous of all is the humanity that surrounds us, our family, spouses, children, and friends.

From the biblical perspective, God was manifest in nature because the forces of nature were beyond the control and understanding of human beings. Nature was much more powerful than any power humanity could muster. In the

millennia since these biblical writings, the power of humanity has grown exponentially. We now have the power to harness nature. We build dams, use fossil fuels, and even split atoms to produce electricity. We use plants, chemicals, and harness microorganisms to make drugs and do work. We fling ourselves through the skies and launch ourselves into space. But we also create waste, pile it up, bury it and burn it. We pollute water and make air unbreathable. Rather than inspiring wonder, piling up garbage inspires disgust. The world has become very small, not because of the Internet, but rather that the 4 billion world's population in biblical times is now approaching 8 billion. Four billion people couldn't do much damage, but 8 billion of us are becoming quite crowded and are competing for resources.

Our scientists overwhelmingly agree that there is imminent danger from climate change. They also continue to warn us of a dangerous decline in worldwide biodiversity. It is clear we must change our ways but this is nothing new. Even among the biblicists' awe was a recognition that we must take responsibility for the world we have been given. God took humanity and placed it into the garden of Eden to serve it and protect it (Gen 2:15).

Our awe of nature must necessarily be coupled with true stewardship. Every human being has the power to serve and protect our world. Some have the capacity to design new products and new technologies that use fewer resources and produce less waste. All of us have the capacity to reduce, reuse, repurpose and recycle.

May the awe of the nature around us inspire us to be good guardians of the gifts God has given to all humanity.

Sunday, May 19 was the last day of Temple Emanu-El Religious School classes for 5779. We celebrated our religious school teachers, faculty assistants, substitute teachers and students. We are so grateful to all of them, for their energy, enthusiasm and commitment all year long. We feel good about all that we accomplished together. We also appreciate the support that school parents gave to us during the year.

Many of the staff members, including the two of us, were new in our roles this year. We also welcomed 8 new students this year, who represented a 14% increase in our student population. It required a lot of willingness on everyone's part, to jump into the unknown, to be flexible, to learn to ask for help, to tap into resources around us, to live with the discomfort of not always knowing all the answers right away and to simply trust our instincts on the spot.

After special presentations to the staff, we continued the tradition of recognizing perfect and excellent attendance among our students (as we know, successful learning and good attendance go hand in hand). We enjoyed a lovely barbecue picnic outside on the grass and the first row of parking spots, which we closed. Staff, parents and children enjoyed socializing and playing basketball, frisbee, badminton, ladder ball, sidewalk chalk and even soccer volleying. Many thanks to Brotherhood members Jonathan Rowe, Scott Zettler, Mike Reinhard and Geoff Hausmann and the faculty assistants and parents who helped with set up and clean up. Even the weather cooperated. It was a perfect way to cap a great year.

This year, we introduced some new things such as the tzedakah song during morning greetings, additional school security procedures and monthly family events to encourage more community interactions such as the Family Bingo Night, our two Havdalah pajama movie nights and the Basket Bonanza Sock Hop.

We reconfigured mid-week Hebrew classes so that they could practice Hebrew reading skills, including practicing Hebrew prayers and learning new modern Hebrew vocabulary or expressions. They also enjoyed learning some modern Hebrew through movement activities, such as when they made Israeli salad with Roy while learning the names of the ingredients and action games in the social hall.

More recently, to honor our beloved teacher Terri Goldsmith, the students planted pink lily bulbs in the garden along the walkway to the school atrium doors. Those will bloom beautifully next year among the daffodils that the students planted previously in that garden in honor of the Holocaust children on Yom Hashoah. This year, they also planted gladiola bulbs along the fence in front of the Noah's Ark playground as part of the Yom Hashoah assembly activity.

The children practiced Mitzvot through action and tzedakah. Students helped to honor school parents and Temple members who served the armed forces at a special Veteran's Day assembly. They donated toys to families in need at Chanukah. They put together Mishloach Manot bags filled

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with toiletries and snacks, which were donated to Safe Futures (benefits victims of domestic violence) at Purim. And at the end of the school year, the children voted to donate a total of \$750 in tzedakah that they collected all year to three local non-profit organizations: Safe Futures, High Hopes Therapeutic Riding (benefits people with disabilities) and the New London Meal Center.

We appreciate all the positive and constructive feedback we have been receiving from parents with the school survey. If you haven't yet submitted your survey response, please send it in. We are sharing results with the Religious School Committee so that we as a team can continue to work together to improve the school to address the needs and concerns of our students and their families.

Many thanks again for the consistent support of Rabbi Ekstrand and Sherry Barnes, the Religious School Committee, all our dedicated teachers, faculty assistants, and substitute teachers, and all of our room parents who volunteered their time and energy whenever called upon. We hope you will all return in your roles next year.

We also give our special thanks to our amazing Young Israeli Emissaries Liron and Roy for the fantastic ideas and creative lessons which they brought to life for our students all year long. We wish them all the best as they return to Israel to embark on their next chapters.

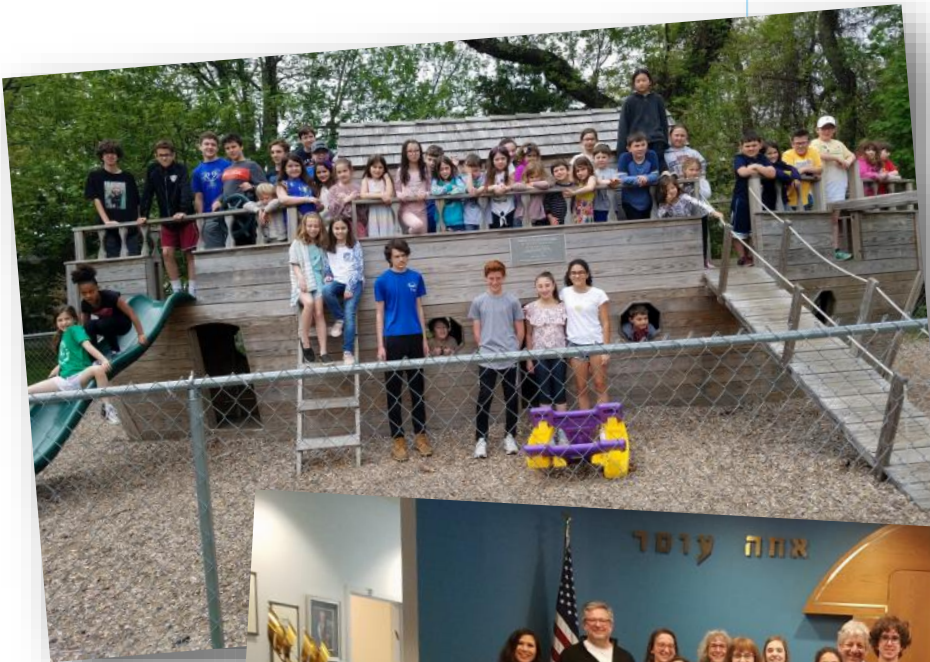

Social Action

What follows is essentially a status report regarding most of the projects that Social Action is involved in.

THE TEMPLE EMANU-EL'S MITZVAH CORPS IS IN PLACE AND READY TO ASSIST. The goal of the Mitzvah Corps is to help congregants who have emergency needs as well as those who need home visits, assistance with rides, getting to appointments, or providing help for day to day activities etc. Although over the past year the Mitzvah Corps has provided a variety of help for several temple congregants, the process and the delivery of the service needs to be coordinated and delivered in a more effective manner. That is one of the goals for the Mitzvah Corps in the upcoming year.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY. Habitat monthly Builds are again up and running. Our next Build is on June 2 from 12:30 to 4:30. (This is the date of the Temple's annual meeting, but the meeting is in the morning, and the Build is in the afternoon.) We work together with Beth-El and sometimes Hillel at Connecticut College.

We need new Temple Emanu-El Build volunteers. Over the last couple of years there has been volunteer slippage that has not been replaced. Finally, there have been some changes in Habitat and the monthly Builds. Our supervisor Ed Goldberg is new to the position. The Volunteer Coordinator has also changed and is now Cindy Jordan. Any temple member who is interested in volunteering for the Sunday Builds should contact Marty Zeldis.

THE NEW LONDON COMMUNITY MEALS CENTER. For many years than can be counted temple volunteers have prepared, provided and cleaned up after a meal at the New London Soup Kitchen. The meal we provide is a monthly project—the third Tuesday of each month—and the coordinator is and has been Hali Keeler. Hali indicates that everything is going smoothly. If you want to help though, you

should contact Hali.

There is also a Soup Kitchen in Groton and temple members are involved there. The Groton kitchen does not provide all meals. If interested in volunteering there, you should contact Matt Shulman.

START FRESH. This is the program for refugees in this area. The program focuses on advocacy for refugees who are in Connecticut. If interested in being involved, contact Karen Bloustine.

NAR-ANON. Our involvement is simply being at the Temple when Nar-Anon has its weekly-Thursday-evening meetings. Being there is necessary. For more information, contact the Rabbi.

RED CROSS BLOOD DRIVE. On August 26 there will be a Red Cross Blood Drive at the temple. While our connection to the drive is limited, if interested in being involved in the drive, you should contact Marty Zeldis or Paul Kanfer. **To schedule an appointment to donate blood, contact the Red Cross at 1-800-REDCROSS or go to www.redcrossblood.org.**

There are a myriad of other programs and projects [remember we can help the congregation and help with our building and our grounds] where we are or can be involved. Further, we will be doing at least two Mitzvah Days in the upcoming year (Our First Responder Holiday Dinner was a resounding success in December), and we have historically been connected to the Homeless Shelter and to Safe Futures. We can do just so much. We need more people and probably younger people to be involved with Social Action at the temple. Keep that in mind as you enjoy your summer and make plans for next year.

Community-wide Program on Inclusion on Erev Shavuot, Sat., June 8

The Torah teaches Jews of every background were present for the giving of the Torah at Sinai: Jews-by-birth and Jews-by-choice, persons who were (visibly) whole alongside those who were broken or in need of wholeness, Jews of every hue, family station or sexual orientation. We stood as one before our Creator in a manner we have been hard-pressed to replicate since.

This year on Erev Shavuot (**Saturday, June 8**), the anniversary of this great convocation, Jews from across Eastern Connecticut will gather at **Temple Emanu-El at 7:30 p.m.** for a program entitled “**We All Stood at Sinai: Inclusion in the Jewish Community.**” We will be looking at diversity within our

own community and examining ways that we inadvertently deny individuals who depart from our unstated “norms” equal access to Jewish life that they aspire to and others enjoy.

The program is participatory in nature, and it is the organizers’ hope is that representatives of the participating *kehillot* (Temple Emanu-El, Congregation Beth El, Beth Jacob Synagogue, Congregation Ahavath Achim, Temple Bnai Israel) and of the community more broadly will choose to share ways in which their experience of Jewish life and Jewish community has been shaped by their own demographics and circumstances. 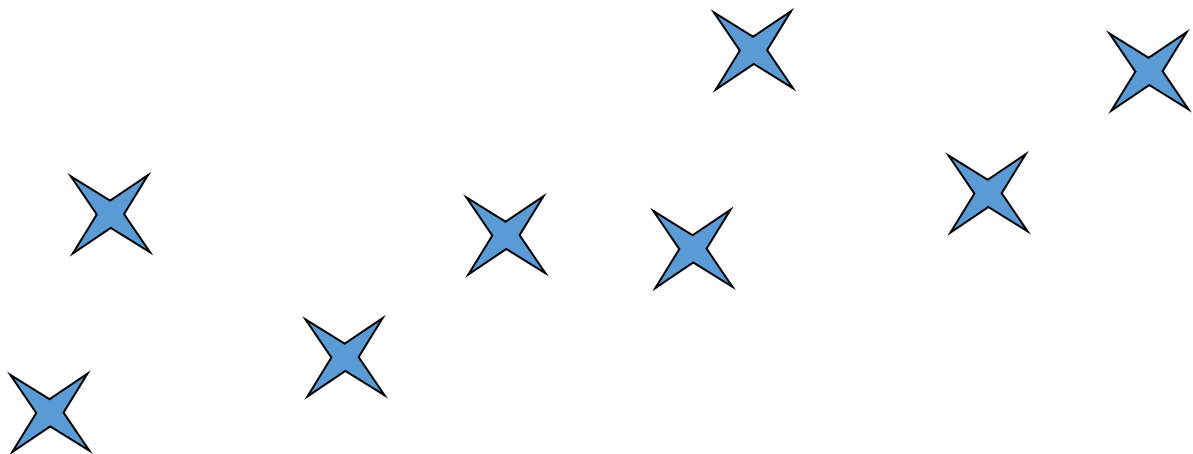
