Rabbi's Message -Marc Ekstrand

Friends,

Sherry Barnes, David Stein and I just returned from the Biennial of the Union for Reform Judaism. Over five thousand Reform Jews gathered in Chicago for

the conference. It was five days of sharing experiences and knowledge with our colleagues in large and small congregations across North America, Europe and Israel. Seminars and presentations covered topics including engagement, social justice, liturgy, theology, text studies, education, synagogue management and leadership, Reform Zionism and music. Most important, our leadership gave us a vision for the future. As I have told you many times in the past three years, our movement is not shrinking and is certainly not dying. However, Rabbi Rick Jacobs, URJ President, advised us that our future depends upon us rolling up the sides of our tent and pulling on the ropes to make our tent ever bigger. We must be making more room for more diversity. The future of Reform Judaism depends upon our congregations being ever more welcoming, even more inclusive, and reaching out even farther. The younger generations of Jews today will not be engaged in the same ways that we were. We should not be asking of our children, why can't you just be like us? Rather, we should be supporting them in reforming the liberal Judaism we love into the Reform Judaism that inspires them. As you've heard many times, 'Reform' is present tense and active. It is always happening. That has always been our strength.

Speaking of strength. WE NEED YOUR VOTE! The World Zionist Congress (WZC) elections are coming up. Voting will be open between January 21 and March 11 (the day after MLK Day until Purim). The Reform movement did extremely well in the last elections in 2015. This accomplished a great deal for us in Israel. It ensured \$20 million dollars over five years went to support our movement.

With this critical support, liberal Judaism has grown incredibly in Israel. Over the past five years the number of Reform communities has grown from 23 to 52. There are well over 100 Israeli Reform rabbis ordained from HUC-JIR in Jerusalem, Reform Jews sit at the table for important decision making at the Jewish Agency and KKL-JNF. Because of our presence and strength, our Reform leaders are able to insist on pluralism in Israel. That means justice and fairness with regards to marriage, conversion and burial regulations, funding for religious institutions, and appointments to important national offices. Because of our presence and strength, we are also building important bridges between Reform leaders and other stakeholders including the ultra-Orthodox parties. This is not about forcing our will on others, it is about guaranteeing our seat at the table when important agreements are negotiated and major issues are debated. An Israel that reflects our values of democracy and pluralism depends upon our vote.

Because we did so well in the 2015 elections, there are many organizations that are creating and working strategies to squeeze the Reform movement out of the 2020 WZC. Thus, we must not only equal our voting in the last election, we must surpass it. David Stein is our WZC Election Captain. David and I will be communicating with you many times between now and Purim. We will be explaining what the WZC and affiliated organizations are, what they do, and why it matters to us. We will also be explaining how to vote and helping everyone to do it. Consider this a warm-up for next November. You should have only one New Year's resolution - to vote in the WZC elections...and then the US elections.

Lastly, the next URJ Biennial will be in Washington, DC, December 8-11, 2021. We have a strong movement behind us. If we engage with it, it will help us achieve our mission of building a vibrant community through Reform Judaism. Put the next biennial on your calendar. If you can't go yourself, perhaps you can help send some of our leadership team.

In particular, I can't ensure my presence at our regularly scheduled Board meetings. The Board has been discussing this and Jo-el Fernandez has worked with the Board to determine our path. We will try a technology solution to start (video conferencing, teleconference, etc). If my lack of actual presence is a detriment to effective oversight of the business of the congregation, we will move to plan B.

You may be aware that Carin Savel, the Executive Director of the JFEC, has been moving the community toward a vision of a centralized Jewish campus that could include constructing a new multipurpose building near our property to house the Federation and other useful services. This is in the visioning/feasibility stage and we have three of our congregants on the newly established Jewish Community Campus Steering Committee. The campus will not require any funds coming from Temple Emanu-El. We will still focus on our mission and our finances first. However,

I do strongly support a centralized community with flexible meeting and social space, senior services, learning centers for all denominations of Judaism and more. A gym perhaps...?

I wrote in my article two months ago that members of the Board will be hosting meetings at their homes to share with you some of the things going on in the community (such as the community campus idea) and also to get your feedback on the state of the congregation. Hopefully by the time this article has been published, someone reached out to you to participate. If not, feel free to contact me, Jo-el or the office.

The cost to you is exactly the same, but NMJL gives a portion back for charitable collectors. Social Action

As the year 2019 ended there was concerted discussion among members of the committee to do a substantial project similar to last year's very successful First Responders' Dinner. After discussion with individual members, it was decided not to try to replicate last year's project. There were other suggestions made:

First, to do a project that will tackle linking the homeless, and those who are unwilling, even in the winter, to seek available shelter with this area's homeless shelter, the New London Homeless Hospitality Center with an eye towards working together to alleviate the problem.

Second is connecting the sweets and cold of Valentine's Day and February with our local Meals on Wheels.

There is a Social Action Committee meeting scheduled for Sunday, January 12 at 10 A.M. at which these and other matters are expected to be discussed.

As for some of Social Action's other ongoing projects, there was a **Habitat Sunday Build** in the cold on December 8 where we worked on two homes in Norwich (a

brand-new duplex). Thank goodness for space heaters, we were able to tape, caulk, and plastic seal the exterior walls and upper levels of the houses. (Nobody says that helping to build homes is glamorous). As always so far, and in combination with Beth El, we had enough volunteers to get all the necessary work done despite the freezing weather. Our next Sunday Build is scheduled for the afternoon of January 12, 2020. We encourage new volunteers. In this regard Social Action will seek to sponsor a Habitat Friday night service in the near future where the ins and outs of Building Habitat homes can be discussed.

Without ever missing a beat, the Temple, coordinated by Hali Keeler, has been successfully preparing and serving an evening meal at New London's Community Meal Center for more than a decade. This happens on the third Tuesday of every month. January of the New Year and the new decade will be no exception.

Finally, the Mitzvah Corps appears to be functioning more effectively than it has in the past, although there continues to be room for improvement.
