# Rabbi's Message -Marc Ekstrand

Dear Friends,

One can often work for years without any substantial confirmation that what we are doing is heading in the right direction or that the things we are doing are

effective. Often the time from first creating a vision until the vision bears fruit is measured in years, if not a lifetime. The purpose was to explore what you want the congregation to be. A common theme expressed was that we ought to be reaching outside Temple Emanu-El to build relationships.

We have worked very hard at Temple Emanu-El to build relationships within the Jewish community. For all the high-profile fits and starts that have been frustrating to many, I believe there are many examples of the liberal Jewish congregations in our area working together very well. Because of the commitment of the rabbis and lay leaders, we have had engaging and joyous community programs for Shavuot and Simchat Torah for several years now. This spring we are going to add Purim to the list of congregational collaborative events.

But for Reform Judaism, it is not enough just to be thinking inside the Jewish community. Reform Judaism has always been concerned not only with Judaism for the sake of Jews, but Judaism for the sake of the world. Reform Jews have always aimed to do tikkun olam, repair of the world. In order to repair the world, we need good partners, both Jewish and non-Jewish.

Last year we reached across the world make connections with Reform Jews in Israel. Many of you will remember that back in November, Rabbi Or and Feliza Zohar were here for their second Artist in Residence weekend at Temple Emanu-El. This November's weekend we wanted to do even more bridge building. In faith-based work, good friends make good partners, and good partners make good friends.

When I thought of building bridges outside of Temple Emanu-El, I immediately thought of my friend Carolyn Patierno, Pastor at All Souls UU Congregation in New London. We partnered with All Souls to do truly groundbreaking interfaith work. We called it Building Beloved Community. The crescendo of our musical artist in residence weekend was an interfaith Sunday morning service at Temple Emanu-El. The combined Temple Emanu-El – All Souls Choir lifted our roof.

Our success reverberated even in Israel. Rabbi Gilad Kariv, Executive Director of the Israel Movement for Reform and Progressive Judaism praised our work at the URJ Biennial in Chicago because we not only built a bridge to Israel but connected it outside the Jewish community here. The vision expressed by Isaiah, for us to be a light to the nations, has borne fruit.

Soon, as we celebrate our 60th year, we will have a full house at 29 Dayton Road. God willing, we will soon be able to work out a way for Beth El to rent space in our building in a way that benefits both congregations. In the fall, All Souls will also be renting space from us while they renovate and enlarge their building. We will be returning the kindness that All Souls extended to us almost 60 years ago when we were just starting out. My hope is that we take every opportunity to strengthen the bridges we have built. If we do, then our light will shine even more brightly. This light is desperately needed in our broken world.

I live in Niantic with my life partner, Sanford "Sandy" Greenhouse, who is a semi-retired physician at Gales Ferry Medical Group. I bring with me a passion for Jewish life, and for Temple Emanu-El. Our Board of Directors is dedicated and supportive, and, together with our talented clergy and staff, will guide our congregation into the future.

My vision for the duration of my presidency will focus on two areas, which I believe to be intertwined: sustainability and building community.

**Sustainability:** I attended my first finance committee meeting in early February, and it was very clear to me that we need to develop an immediate plan to sustain a long term financial future. Frankly, we have tapped out some of our more generous donors and need to ensure that all are contributing in some way towards making our community the vibrant Jewish community that we all want.

It has been said that the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results. We cannot keep asking the same few people to shore up the congregation monetarily, nor can the same handful of congregants continue to serve on the board or on committees. A new fundraiser is also not the answer to sustaining our financial future. Everyone has something to contribute, whether it is increased financial contributions, chairing a committee, or simply showing up at Friday night Shabbat services on a regular basis and bringing some cookies for oneg. There will be many more discussions concerning sustainability in the upcoming months.

**Community:** An important part of building and maintaining a sense of community is communication. The board has been hosting a series of "coffee and conversation" groups in congregants' homes in order to hear from you on a variety of topics. By the time you read this, the meetings should have concluded and the committee will be compiling the data from these groups and submitting a report to the congregation.

Temple leadership is also continuing to actively explore sharing space with Congregation Beth El in the footprint of the current Temple Emanu-El building. I would like to clarify that this is separate and apart from the community campus discussions that are currently occurring between JFEC and the area congregations. We can share space with Beth El regardless of when or if a community campus comes to fruition.

One topic that I heard loud and clear from the attendees at the coffee and conversation group that I facilitated in January is that congregants want and expect transparency from the Temple board about when and how decisions are made. As such, I will be using this column each month to discuss any pertinent actions taken or considered by the board during that timeframe. I will also provide frequent updates on the progress of discussions with Beth El. It is challenging to provide information when discussions may become stale between the time I write this article and the time that the bulletin is published, so I invite congregants to contact me or any board member at any time in between.

At the time of this writing, Beth El and Temple Emanu-El senior leadership have had a number of productive meetings, and Beth El was comfortable enough with the direction of this process to engage an architect to come out and explore the viability of converting 2 classrooms in the Temple Emanu-El school wing into a chapel. The first step in that process is a compliance review to explore zoning and other regulations to determine whether this is even a feasible plan to consider. Prior to this, I had reached out to other Reform congregations across the country who are sharing space with Conservative congregations. I received a great deal of helpful advice and feedback in this process. The one message that I heard repeatedly from many congregations is that despite some growing pains in the process of developing the agreement, in the end, these types of arrangements were a phenomenal success, and were of mutual benefit to both congregations.

Given our focus on both sustainability and building community, I feel strongly that this arrangement will be mutually beneficial to Temple Emanu-El and Congregation Beth El as well. I know that there are still some lingering concerns expressed by a few members. In the hopes of alleviating these concerns, please refer to the separate "questions and answers" article in this bulletin.

In addition, the best way to find out what happens at board meetings is to become a member of the board! Gail Weber has agreed to head up this year's nominating committee, so please contact her if you are interested in becoming more involved in Temple governance.

Wonderful memories of collecting sea glass and laughing as she tried to find a place to keep the sea glass, but it kept falling out of her shirt. No one had a laugh as heart felt, and from the belly, as Terri's laugh. She loved birds, any kind, well maybe not turkey vultures. Her garden and backyard were filled with hummingbirds, crows, hawks, finches, bluebirds, blue jays, cardinals, and the list goes on and on. She made a sanctuary in her garden that she tended with such love and creativity. If you had a chance to spend time there, it was a slice of heaven. She was also the most creative person I knew. She could make something from nothing. Her basement was filled with every bobble imaginable. Glass jars, twinkle lights, material, and glitter. Anything she could use to teach kids, create an oasis, a shuk (marketplace), Cabaret decorations, or challah babies. Terri's amazing creativity flowed into the food she cooked. She loved to make bread on the grill and whip up a wonderful dinner from things she had in the fridge. She loved to entertain, and I loved listening to her create an amazing menu...and always something vegan for me. One day, after her cancer diagnosis, she said she wanted to make me vegan cupcakes, they were so good. I told her she didn't have to do that for me, and she said that she wanted them.

Funny that she only ate one and gave the rest to me to take home. Terri was more like a sister than a friend. She always took care of me through all of my life crushing moments. She was the first one I told that I was getting a divorce. She wouldn't let me go to court alone, and I'm glad she convinced me to let her take me. I could go on and on about what a wonderful person she was, but I think those of you that were fortunate to have known her, understand that she was one of a kind. We were friends for 33 years. Though the memories are still bittersweet, and I wish she were still here, I will cherish every memory. Some days those memories are accompanied by heartache and tears, and sometimes, I still hear that amazing laugh and it makes me laugh. Grief is a rollercoaster and I will ride that ride through tears and laughter and always keep her close.

# Sharing space with Beth El -- Questions and Answers

# What do you mean by "Sharing Space?"

Congregation Beth El and Temple Emanu-El are currently exploring the feasibility of Beth El converting 2 classrooms in the school wing into a chapel. This would allow Beth El to utilize this space to worship during times that Temple Emanu-El is utilizing the sanctuary. When Temple Emanu-El is not utilizing the sanctuary, we would welcome our Beth El friends to pray in it. Rigorous calendar control would be required in order to avoid miscommunication over use of space.

#### Is this really a first step towards a merger?

No. This is a first step towards ensuring that each congregation is sustainable for many years in the future. Beth El will

be paying for the renovations to the building to create a chapel and will lease the space from Temple Emanu-El under a long-term lease and joint operating agreement.

# But I don't want to be Conservative! I like my Reform Jewish identity!

Good news! Temple Emanu-El will continue to be the vibrant Reform Jewish congregation that it is now! By the same token, Beth El will remain a strong Conservative congregation, just as they are now. Some social and religious activities will be shared. For example, we have done community Simchat Torah and Shavuot observances, with considerable success. However, each congregation will retain their own religious identity, their own rabbi, etc.



# Starry Night Celebrates Temple's 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary






