Rabbi's Message -Marc Ekstrand

Friends,

Like most of you, I've been spending nearly all of my time at home lately. Polly and I have had to do some rearranging in the house. As you have seen on Fri-

day nights, part of our house has become our Zoom sanctuary. That is a lot of stress on everyone. I am grateful to Polly, Nava, Ilan and Aaron for making it work as well as it has. It hasn't been smooth sailing but we've all done our best. During the reorganizing, I came across some old pictures and papers that came from my mother's house. There was an envelope my father had stuffed in a drawer that had not been touched since he died in 1990. Inside the envelope, there were pictures of my grandparents, my brother, and me. Tucked inside a portfolio with a picture of my father's mother, Alice, was the ketubah of my mother's parents, Anne and Meyer Greenberg. Looking at the ketubah, I noticed that my grandparents were married in 1936.

Many of us have been reading about the Spanish flu epidemic that came in three waves in 1918 and 1919. As I was looking at the Ketubah I realized that my grandparents and their parents struggled then just as we are now with COVID-19. As it happens, I also have a copy of my grandfather's birth certificate. He was born in 1913 and thus would have been the same age as Nava and Ilan during the Spanish flu epidemic. I imagine that Meyer, or Mike as he became known, was probably just like Ilan and Nava. They understand that something is going on. They call it "the sickness". But, they take it in stride. When my mother-in-law, Carole, lovingly made and sent each of us a couple of masks from Minnesota, Nava and Ilan reacted with giddy excitement, like it was an early birthday present. The masks were of all kinds of patterns; flowers, insects, frogs, paisleys, and more. It helps to have a quilter in the family. Nava and Ilan couldn't wait to get out in public and wear their masks.

I wonder if my great grandmother was making masks for her family. Surely she was. Newspapers from 1918 reported that everyone was wearing masks. It was mandated by law. Some were even arrested for not wearing them. Most government, civic leaders, and the public understood what was at stake. This isn't 1918, but we are faced with a similar, extraordinary public health crisis. It is not the Spanish flu but, COVID-19 is highly contagious and deadly. It is not just one of the common flu strains. Most of us get a vaccine for those. Our high rate of vaccination protects even those who choose or can't have the flu vaccine. There is no vaccine yet for COVID-19. Combating this disease will only be successful if we think more about the people around us than we do ourselves.

Just as in 1918, many are making masks. Some are simple, made with spare fabric, elastic string, and staples. Others are more complicated and fashionable. Whatever the style, please make one or get one and wear one. It is really not about you. The mask isn't meant to protect you. Rather it is meant to protect others from you. If you become infected, you likely will not know about it for days. If you are not wearing a mask, you will spread the virus to many people during that time. We are taught in the Talmud, Sanhedrin 37a, that to save one life is as if to save a whole, while to take one life is as if to destroy an entire world. Wearing a mask is an imperative that is for the sake of our world.

Additionally, until there is sufficient immunity, testing, and contact tracing capability, we just simply cannot be face to face. We must physically distance. This is hard for everyone. We are doing our best, transferring some activities to the internet, being creative, and even adding new programs. We are not in person, but we are able to be face to face, celebrating, mourning, learning, and comforting each other. The response has been phenomenal. My estimation is that service attendance is up by about 50%. I see a lot of smiling and engaged young people on Sunday mornings in the programs created by Armi Rowe and Jennifer Zettler. I see many families joining us on Friday nights and for Havdalah on Saturday evenings. I see meaningful shiva gatherings. We have a great new book group that just started. These are good things, pandemic or not. And when this is over, our online presence will remain. I look forward to the day that we can be in the same space, but for now, face to face in cyberspace is not only holding us together it is helping us grow and thrive.

All of that sounds very positive. However, many of us are also struggling. If you are struggling, please know we are still connected. If you need a mask, food, someone to pick

up a prescription, or maybe just a friendly voice, reach out. I am making my way through our phone list with the objective of contacting every family. If you haven't received your call yet, you will. But you also don't have to wait. I'm always here for you. Reach out to me by phone, email, WhatsApp, Zoom, or even paper and pen – any way that is comfortable for you. We *are* all in this together.

President's Message - Jo-el Fernandez



The days are getting longer. The calendar says spring is here, although as I sit here in my wool socks, it doesn't feel that way. We made it through a Passover holiday that was unlike any that we have ever experienced. The question, "Why is this night different than all other

nights?" was especially poignant this year, as we looked at friends and family through a computer screen instead of passing the charoset and hiding the afikomen with them. And yet, we are still a community. We have Zoom classes, services, meetings, living room concerts, and sadly, funeral and shiva gatherings. We still find ways to be together in joyous times, and to comfort one another in times of sorrow and loss. This is what Temple Emanu-El is and always will be about to me---community.

With regard to sustainability, the Temple completed an application and gathered supporting documents for the Payroll Protection Program loan from the SBA, to help Temple Emanu-El keep Rabbi Marc, Sherry, Roberta, Don, and our kitchen staff on the payroll during this time. Roberta did an extraordinary amount of work to gather all of the documents needed for the application and get them to me expeditiously, at a time of extraordinary personal heartache for her and her family. Unfortunately, the first batch of funding was depleted while the paperwork was still being processed by the bank. We are hopeful that we will be one of the first in line if and when new funding is made available by Congress. In the meantime, a number of our very generous members stepped up to the plate and contributed to the Temple Reserve Fund, to help us balance our budget through the end of the fiscal year during this time of unprecedented hardship to individuals, businesses, and nonprofits. While I am in the process of thanking each of these donors individually, I wish to take this opportunity to thank them

here publicly as well. Without them, our sustainability would be significantly challenged.

Our in-person operations remain suspended indefinitely at this time. The state of Connecticut has determined that our doors will remain shut at least through May 20. My assumption is that it will be longer than this. When we are able to reopen, it will be with well thought-out plans in place for social distancing. To that end, the executive board has determined that the annual meeting, scheduled for June 7th, will occur via Zoom. While we will miss the camaraderie, and especially the Brotherhood breakfast, it is unsafe to consider holding an in-person congregation-wide meeting at this time. Rabbi Marc and I are working out the logistics of ensuring the integrity of the voting process via Zoom, and materials will be made available to the congregation prior to the meeting. The Temple board and the relevant committees will also be looking ahead as far as the High Holidays in order to develop contingency plans in the event that it is not safe for our congregants to be together in the sanctuary at the same time by then. While we hope for the best, we also must plan for a new reality. Other Reform congregations around the country are grappling with the same issue. I plan to participate in a Union for Reform Judaism Conference of Presidents webinar in May where this will be a featured topic.

Until we can meet in person again, stay home, stay safe, and stay connected with one another. Rabbi Marc, myself, and the rest of the board are only an e-mail or a phone call away.

It is late April and extraordinarily difficult times affect us all. The Temple is virtually closed, except virtually. Those who are working are, if possible, working at home and everybody else is discovering that the once a week highlight of the day is going to the supermarket. Formal Social Action at the Temple gives way to individual Social Action—making sure that our loved ones are safe and well. The irony is that when helping those most in need is most urgent, our ability to provide that help is extremely limited. Providing Social Action must recognize the difficulties pushed upon us by the virus, and we need to all do whatever is required to live through this pandemic and get to its end as healthy and as fit as we possibly can be. Finally, we must all recognize and fully appreciate the heroic work that is being done by our first responders.

Turning to a few specifics:

Habitat for Humanity has rescheduled our April-Sunday-Build to Sunday, May 17. As things stand now it is likely that this Build date will also be rescheduled.

The New London Soup Kitchen is not open in the normal sense, but as of now the Temple participates, in a limited way, by preparing food which is boxed and then given out at the door. Let's hope that by the third Tuesday in May things

will be more normal.

The Homeless Hospitality Center is open. They are in need of masks, and we are on occasion providing meals when they are otherwise not available.

The Social Action Committee is putting together a project to make masks that will be available to congregants and then, where needed, to the community at large where the need is great. Unprecedented. Uncharted territory. We have embraced this reality, adapting to the changing CDC social distancing guidelines, as we navigate Temple Emanu-El Religious School through the rest of the school year. The most recent Temple

Board update requires that we not be back in our building until at least May 20. Our anticipated last day of school is June 21st. We are determined to keep our school community connected and to help our students continue to learn their prayer, Hebrew, and Judaics, despite new challenges. Throughout the month of April, we reconnected face-to-face with our students and their families through weekly Zoom calls on Sunday mornings. We enjoyed sharing updates like show-and-tell craft projects; celebrating Passover virtually through a fun sing-along with Hazzan Sherry (hazzan is the Hebrew term for cantor); and catching up with emissaries Tal and Roi who had to leave CT abruptly. Each week, we sent our students links to Passover story videos, songs and craft projects. On the Zoom calls, we offered virtual story time and discussions about Earth Day/Bal Tashchit and Yom HaShoah. Students enjoyed a fun way to review and learn by playing interactive games together like Pesach JewParody, Hebrew Hangman and a Religious School Kahoot! trivia game that reviewed a variety of Judaic, Hebrew, Israel and Jewish mitzvot concepts and facts.

We have been consulting with staff and members of the Religious School Committee to determine the best way for us to reconfigure the school curriculum for distance learning by grade. The reality is that the learning environment at school cannot be exactly replicated at home as learning dynamics vary at home, which are being impacted by many factors: parental input/time, technology resources/access and anxiety levels given secular school distance learning workload. We

will do our best to determine what is most important for the students to work on and what is most realistic given our new environment.

As we move forward in May, we will strive to provide our students with more structure, and more importantly, keep the learning fun. We just rolled out a new prayer Hebrew app for computers, tablets and smartphones called PrayerTech which students can log on to individually as our staff follows their progress remotely. The students have ways to follow along and record themselves reading Hebrew prayers according to their grade's curriculum. There are matching and completion games that test Hebrew word recognition ability. These apps offer appealing visual and audio features. For Judaics, we will continue to teach about the Torah people and their stories, Jewish holidays, basic Jewish concepts and history as appropriate.

The good news is that even without the building and with limited physical resources, we are managing to stay connected as a community with our students and their families through technology. We ask families for their patience and trust as we enter the unknown together. We promise to keep lessons informative, fun and realistic in terms of time commitment. Please stay tuned for more updates.

We pray for everyone's continued strong health and safety.
