



Rabbi's Message - Marc Ekstrand

Friends,

Summer has just begun. It will be a summer unlike any we've experienced before. The world is changing quickly before our eyes.

Since I wrote in this bulletin last, another social earthquake occurred. The murder of George Floyd has triggered social protests and marches across our country and around the world. These protests serve to cast yet another, even brighter light on systematic racism not only within our police and justice systems but also in healthcare and the marketplace. As I am writing to you now, the protests have not subsided but have evolved. The attention of both protestors and civic leaders has now turned to monuments. Stalled silent debates about the balance between progressive policy and preserving history have been replaced by swift action to remove symbols erected as much to intimidate minorities as they were to honor perceived heroes. By the time you read this, the protests will likely have set its sight on a different dimension of systematic inequality. As messy and ugly as this process has been, I think there is an overwhelming reason to have hope.

I have hope because our Jewish traditions, values, and experiences have prepared us to be allies and leaders in the public conversations shaping the face of change in our communities. We have a long tradition of storytelling, evidenced in our sacred texts. In these stories, we deal with the messiness of life. We grapple with eternal human struggles against baseless hatred. They inform how we can live in an imperfect world with faith and love in our hearts. Equally present in our sacred texts is a tradition of discourse. We engage in centuries-long debates and often preserve multiple perspectives, not just the loudest voice of any age. We recorded our struggles not only in narratives and discourse but also in performative rituals. These processes allow us to bring the wisdom gained from our collective experiences of destruction, exile, oppression, and hardship into our present challenging moments. If we engage with our narratives, discourses, and experiences, we can empathize with grieving parents, victims of hate crimes, sufferers of injustice, and those imprisoned in wall-less ghettos.

This summer will be necessarily different from any in recent memory as much because of the masks we will continue to wear as the conversations in which we will be engaged. As I wrote last month, when the pandemic is over, life will not return to as it was before. Our experiment of living in a virtual world will inform a more strongly connected and collaborative community. The social protests we are seeing and participating in will help us engage in essential conversations on racial justice and structural inequalities in our communities. Our voice is critical in these conversations. We must participate.

Over the summer, while I am simultaneously trying to take a little time off with my family, I will be continuing meaningful conversations and getting more involved in the Reform Movement's 2020 Civic Engagement Campaign – Every Voice, Every Vote. Over the next six months, we can make real progress towards a more just society. The 2020 Civic Engagement Campaign is not about politics. It is about bringing our Reform Jewish values to essential conversations in non-partisan ways. Our community will not reflect our values unless we are engaged in purposeful civic conversations. President's Message - Jo-el Fernandez



As I write this, the state of Connecticut is entering "Phase 2" of reopening. This means that indoor dining, movie theaters, and nail salons will be open for business, just to name a few. What about Temple Emanu-El, you may ask? Does this mean that we go back to "business as usual?"

The answer to that is unequivocally, no. We need a new normal, characterized first and foremost by a willingness to put the safety of others ahead of our personal preferences and

a willingness to hold ourselves and others accountable to new safety protocols. Returning to the way that we were would fly in the face of our Reform Jewish values, which assert that Judaism must change and adapt to the needs of the day if it is to survive. We embrace the concept of "audacious hospitality," which is a focused effort to embrace diversity and to welcome full participation by LGBTQ+ Jews, Jews with mental, physical, or intellectual disabilities, and interfaith families. Included in this are our oldest and most medically fragile members. How do we relaunch an improved Temple Emanu-El that meets the needs of all of our members? And how can we be a leader in developing a reimagined Jewish community in southeastern Connecticut?

By the time that you read this, you will have received a survey from the Union for Reform Judaism via e-mail, which will be available to you until July 6. PLEASE complete this survey, which will allow Temple Emanu-El and the URJ as a whole to reimagine Jewish life in a post-COVID world. This is your chance to share your thoughts on the future of our congregational life.

In the meantime, the Temple Emanu-El COVID-19 ad-hoc committee will be meeting, and will utilize data from this survey as well as science and safety considerations to determine when and in what manner we may be able to re-enter the building and resume some of our pre-COVID operations, including religious services, social activities, school operations, and renting space to tenants. We will be discussing whether activities such as a summer outdoor physically distanced service, or an in-person Tashlich observance on Rosh

Hashanah afternoon may be able to occur. What I am certain of is that when we are able to meet again, things such as the blessings over wine and challah, greeting other congregants and our clergy before and after services, and congregational singing will look very different. Just yesterday, I read an unfortunate news article about a church in Oregon that had a significant COVID-19 outbreak due to members gathering and singing together in defiance of their state's mandates, and disregarding the science that has demonstrated that this is one of the highest risk activities. There is a strong consensus among numerous epidemiologists and infectious disease specialists that in-person religious services are among the most risky of activities that we can do, akin to being in a crowded bar!

While I am dismayed about COVID-19 and its impact on our synagogue and on my own life, I am also excited about the opportunities that this presents to us for increased engagement of our own members as well as increased community collaboration. The combined Tikkun Leil Shavuot evening study session and morning service was a truly remarkable effort by Rabbi Ekstrand and the other four "liberal" congregations of eastern Connecticut. It was a huge success, with a great turnout and very positive feedback afterwards. This is just the beginning! Let's build on this momentum and continue to collaborate with our community partners while maintaining our strong Reform Jewish identity. I would love to hear your ideas!

Sisterhood — Merrill Mazzella & Gail Weber, Co-Presidents


Hi Ladies,

Social Action

The bad news is that the Coronavirus is still a substantial factor in all of our lives, especially in other parts of the Country. The good news is that in Connecticut the virus is greatly diminished and hospitalizations and positive testing for the virus are way down as well. So Connecticut is slowly opening up, and this allows a wide array of social action programs where the Temple is involved to begin to begin again. As an example, **Habitat for Humanity** for Eastern Connecticut has reopened both of its area Restores, and although all of its construction sites are still closed, with the coming of Phase Two of Connecticut's recovery all of Southeastern Connecticut's active construction sites will reopen. A reminder: Habitat needs volunteers. It is expected that by the time of the next bulletin article the Temple's Sunday Builds will be will be functioning again. We were last working in Norwich on an almost completed home. That seems like a million years ago. As for the **Soup Kitchen in New London**, it never shut down completely, but instead provided meals in a different way. Thus in June, Hali Keeler and others from the Temple were still cooking, packaging and making ready for delivery meals for those in need. People need to eat even if there are no jobs, and the area is mostly closed down. Hopefully the New London Community Meal Center will soon be able to serve meals in the traditional way, and Hali and her crew will be there.

Mask Project

The Social Action project that has been most active during the virus crisis is the Temple's mask making and distribution effort. Organized by Matt Shulman, we have made and distributed about 2000 masks to people and agencies that are in need. Since masks are likely going to be with us for a long time to come, there will be an ongoing need for mask makers into the future. If you are interested in joining us, please contact Matt Shulman at 2020Jewishthought@gmail.com. Two things about the project that should be noted: First, the Temple is now working in conjunction with church groups

and others in making and distributing masks. That's positive exposure for us in the Community. Second, most of our mask deliveries are to area agencies like the Covenant Shelter, Waterford Youth & Family Services Inter-Faith Food Locker, the Homeless Hospitality Center, Safe Futures and area Senior Centers. This provides not only multiple positive connections with the Community, but it also gives food for thought regarding other projects we can get involved with when the present virus crisis is under control.

The Social Action Committee welcomes new members, young and old, as well as fresh ideas as to how we can serve the Jewish Community and the Community at large. We expect to resume regular meetings when these extraordinary times are under control, hopefully by no later than the fall.



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
