Rabbi's Message -Marc Ekstrand

Friends,

This secular New Year is bittersweet. A dark winter is upon us. As I am writing, COVID-19 caused deaths have surged to over three hundred thousand. The pandem-

ic is now the worst human tragedy in our lifetime. Far too many have died. Even as Southeastern Connecticut has not suffered as much as other parts of the country, most of us know someone who has died. The human toll for those left behind is also tremendous. Our most senior community members are isolated. Although our schools and teachers have moved mountains, the transition to hybrid or virtual learning has been difficult. Our new normal is wearing masks, keeping our distance, and washing our hands frequently. We are anxious for this to end. We can see the light at the end of the tunnel, yet it is a long way off. That light is vaccines. Yet, many of us may have serious reservations and might be hesitant to accept a vaccine. Jewish values should be our guide.

One of the most fundamental Jewish values is *p'kuach nefesh*. The Talmud teaches us that to save one life is as if to have saved an entire world. The sanctity of life outweighs almost all other considerations. Our tradition also teaches us to accept rational science. Maimonides, the medieval Jewish thinker, and physician, in his commentary on Mishnah Pesachim 4:9, observes that medicines are as essential as food and water to our bodies. We would not deny ourselves food and water, nor should we abstain from proven vaccines. Our tradition further teaches that to refuse proven medical treatment is to commit a sin of arrogance. We are obliged to accept appropriate medical treatment for ourselves and provide it to our children as well. (see CCAR Responsa

Questions remain. Are these new vaccines appropriate and proven medical treatment? How do we know that these vaccines are effective and safe? Most of us cannot answer these questions ourselves, and everything is progressing so quickly. How do we know what reliable information is? For answers, we should depend upon public health, medical, and scientific experts. They have spent lifetimes preparing for this situation. Scientists have been working hard to develop these vaccines for many years. Because of their hard work,

less than a year from the outbreak in the United States, we have two vaccines. As I heard Dr. Peter Hotez, Dean of the National School of Tropical Medicine at Baylor (also a Cornell alumnus!) say recently, the work to develop these vaccines has been progressing for more than 30 years. Scientists have been able to work so quickly because they've been working hard all along. The FDA, NIH, and CDC are staffed with professionals that have been similarly preparing. The vaccine is neither political nor opinion.

Yet, we may still be anxious. Is the vaccine safe? How does it work? Am I just a guinea pig? Will I have a reaction? How long will my immunity last? Will I still have to wear a mask? Can I get the vaccine if I'm pregnant? We should be asking all of these questions. The key is looking in the right places for answers. We are working on creating a public forum for you to learn about the vaccines, how they work, why you should take them if you can, and how our communities are protected even if you cannot take the vaccine. In the coming weeks, we will let you know more details.

In the meantime, remember that we have a long way to go. Use this time to educate yourself with information from reliable sources. You will find links to many resources at www.ct.gov.

We must look out for each other. This is not the time to let down our guard, just the opposite. We need to redouble our efforts to Wear our Masks, Watch our Distance, and Wash our Hands.

While I never want to wish my life away, I think we can all agree that this year has been challenging in so many areas—the pandemic, of course, but also deep moral and political divisions in our country and ongoing racial and social justice

concerns.

There is finally light at the end of the tunnel concerning the pandemic. . As I write this, the first New London County

healthcare workers are being vaccinated to prevent them from contracting COVID-19. Next come the long-term care facility residents and staff, and our elderly and most vulnerable citizens. Hopefully, by late spring/early summer, those of us who choose to be vaccinated will have received the 2-shot series. Those of you who know me are likely aware that I will be there with my sleeve rolled up as soon as my name is called! I urge all of you to discuss this decision with your healthcare providers in order to make a choice for yourself and your family that is grounded in the best science available to us at this time.

With regard to our deep political divisions in our nation, the Union for Reform Judaism's "Every Voice, Every Vote" movement has worked tirelessly to ensure that every voice is heard and that all votes are counted. Nearly 1000 URJ civic engagement campaign participants used the Empower app to reach out to more than 4390 individuals in their own networks to get out the vote, understanding that a text or call from a friend, family member, or fellow congregant will likely be more effective than hearing from a stranger. Overall, the URJ was able to reach more than 550,000 voters in an effort to mobilize them to cast their ballots, and the work continues to ensure that every voice is heard in the Georgia Senate runoff elections occurring this month.

This month, your Temple Emanu-El board has been busy working for you. At our December board meeting, we reviewed and discussed a Synagogue Leadership Excellence tool that is part of a larger URJ Benchmarking and Assessment project. After completing and submitting this ques-

tionnaire, synagogue leadership will have the opportunity to work with a trained mentor to interpret the results, consider strengths to further leverage, and identify and prioritize potential improvements.

I am about to start the process with Chelsea Groton Bank of applying for forgiveness of the Payroll Protection Program loan that we received in May 2020 to help keep our staff on the payroll during the pandemic. Those of you who may have applied for these loans for your own small business know what an onerous process this can be.

With regard to the potential Community Campus project, the executive board met, and then several of us met with the Community Campus committee and the architects who have been hired for the exploration. We were very honest about what we perceive could be the value of a community campus on the property of 29 Dayton Road that would house Temple Emanu-El, Congregation Beth El, and the Jewish Federation of Eastern Connecticut, and we were equally honest about our hopes and fears regarding any such project. The architects will develop a proposal utilizing this feedback that will be presented to the Temple Emanu-El board, and eventually to the congregation at large. I urge you to keep an open mind about this exciting possibility for the Jewish community of southeastern Connecticut. This project has the potential to provide Temple Emanu-El with strong connections with our wider Jewish community, as well as sustainability to exist as a vibrant Reform congregation for many years into the future. Stay tuned for more information!





<u>Next Book Club</u> - Join us on **Monday, February 8 at 7:00 P.M.** – **The Rise of the Rocket Girls** – the riveting true story of the women who launched America into space.

In the 1940s and 50s, when the newly minted Jet Propulsion Laboratory needed quick-thinking mathematicians to calculate velocities and plot trajectories, they didn't turn to male graduates. Rather, they recruited an elite group of young women who, with only pencil, paper, and mathematical prowess, transformed rocket design, helped bring about the first American satellites, and made the exploration of the solar system possible.

For the first time, **Rise of the Rocket Girls** tells the stories of these women – known as "human computers" – who broke the boundaries of both gender and science. Based on ex-

tensive research and interviews with all the living members of the team, *Rise of the Rocket Girls* offers a unique perspective on the role of women in science: both where we've been, and the far reaches of space to which we're heading.

Social Action

AND THEN THERE MIGHT BE LIGHT

I am writing this on the seventh day of Hanukkah, the Festival of Lights. I am writing this for the Temple Bulletin for January, 2021. Most would say good riddance to 2020 and I am among those "most" people. 2020 in many ways has been a difficult time all over the world including, of course, our Temple family. From a Social Action perspective, a cruel irony is that when Social Action is needed the most, we have a difficult enough time making sure that our loved ones are safe, and we are also very limited in where we can go and what we can do. At the beginning of the pandemic, Social Action made and distributed masks to area agencies and groups. That effort was very effective, and very much appreciated--thank you Matt Shulman. But as the pandemic dug in, it became impossible to gather, and difficult to organize, identify specific needs and effectively address those needs. Just going to the grocery store became (and still is) a risky activity. But then, in the middle of Hanukkah, there came Rays of Light--Vaccines were approved distributed and put into the arms of the heroic nurses, doctors and other essential first responders. While it will be several months before all of us can be inoculated, there is light and there is hope! A plea from this corner: when the vaccine is available to you, do not hesitate: get inoculated. It helps not only you but it also helps everyone around you.

So what can Social Action do? At this moment it is not clear, but the answer is undoubtedly that we can do a lot. In January (even though I do not like Zoom) we will have a meeting. For the meeting, I will ask everyone to think about how social action can help alleviate the needs of the Temple Community and the needs of the New London County Community. Volunteering at hospitals, providing transportation, doing shopping, getting people to vaccine locations, helping at area social service agencies, Meals on Wheels, soup kitchens

etc. come to mind. Whenever stories are told about the heroes on the front lines, we see, or they say, that they are exhausted. There must be ways that we can help our heroes continue to do their work and not be so tired. Along these lines, Judy Mann recently told me that the Homeless Hospitality Center in New London needs help of all kinds in transitioning people out of the Center, and into new, hopefully permanent, homes. If you are interested in helping, please contact Judy Mann at 860 536-4784. Also our once a month work at the Community Meals Center in New London has continued unabated throughout the pandemic. (Contact Hali Keeler if you are interested in helping there). The list of things we can do is endless and Social Action, and all of us, should do everything possible to chip in.

Finally, almost a year ago I told the Social Action Committee that someone else should chair the Committee. Then the pandemic struck and made everything different. While we are still not out of the woods, it is way past time for me to stop being the chair of the Committee. Nearly forty years ago, when I was a new member, Rabbi Rosenberg, who was then a new Rabbi, asked me to start Social Action at the Temple. I did, and there have been many other Chairs over the years. In forty years, Social Action has had a vast number of successes as well as a few low points. About eight years ago, Gary Freeman asked me to co-Chair Social Action with him. We did very good things, but then Gary left for Massachusetts. Since then, Social Action has had bunches of successes, but it is time for me to stop being the Chair. We need new blood, fresh ideas and I am not nearly connected enough to the Temple to help accomplish the mission of Social Action at Temple Emanu-El. If interested, please let Roberta or I know and it will be an agenda item at our Zoom meeting in January. STAY SAFE.




