Rabbi's Message -Marc Ekstrand

Friends,

As you receive this bulletin, we are in the middle of summer. Since Shavuot, my gaze has

turned toward the High Holy Days and the fresh new year of 5784. Sherry and I started thinking about the upcoming High Holy Days after Simchat Torah last fall. Now our planning is gaining focus. Sherry and I always put our whole spiritual beings into these most essential sacred days. Barbara Senges and Jo Michaelson are the core of our HHD planning team at this point. We will need help from many of you soon, so don't go too far from your phone or email while you are enjoying the summer.

We are also looking beyond the High Holy Days. With the help of the Board of Trustees, the Religious Practices Committee, and many of you, we've developed a plan for regular service times and themes in the coming year. Our plan is in response to what you have told us. We are listening so that our services and programs are engaging, meaningful, and at times which meet the needs of as many as possible. Below is a general outline we will follow after the High Holy Days. Note that service times will vary. We recognize this could cause confusion. We will communicate clearly through this bulletin, our website calendar, weekly messages, and social media communications.

Here is what a typical month will look like starting in October:

First Friday is Share Shabbat at 6:30 PM – Our Religious School students, teachers, and families lead our Kabbalat Shabbat worship during Share Shabbat. As many of you have already experienced, our students are fun-loving but seriously engaged in their Judaism. This is a service for our entire community. We try to keep this service to 1 hour because even I have trouble focusing for over an hour.

Second Fridays at 6:30 PM – This earlier service will have rotating themes and time for guest speakers. We hope an earlier service time will work well for our families with children and our older friends who would rather not drive later in the evening.

Third Fridays Shabbat Dinner at 6:30 PM – We will not have a traditional Kabbalat Shabbat service on Third Fridays. There will be a semi-pot luck Shabbat dinner (plans are still developing) just like what you might have at home, just bigger and with a few additions. In addition to dinner, you can expect candle lighting, Kiddush, and a Shabbat sing-along. In between, we will always have Birkat Hamazon (Blessing after meals), Mi Shebeirach (Prayer for healing), recite Kaddish Yatom for those observing Yahrzeit, and a very short d'var Torah or presentation relating to the weekly Torah portion or other timely Jewish themes. Mostly this will be a time to socialize and enjoy Shabbat with new and old friends.

Fourth Fridays at 7:30 PM – This is a later service to respond to many we have heard from who can't do an earlier service. Like second Fridays, we will have rotating themes based on the Jewish Calendar, community issues and concerns, and room for guest speakers. Typically, this service will be about an hour and fifteen minutes.

Fifth Fridays at 6:30 PM – (December, March, and May) This is an earlier service that will have rotating themes and room for guest speakers like second Fridays. We hope the earlier service time will work well for our families with children and our older friends who would rather not drive later in the evening. Usually, this service will be about an hour and fifteen minutes.

Why so much change? Haven't we been doing this for hundreds of years? Yes, but we change, and the world around us changes too. There has always been a creative edge within Judaism, so our tradition is not an anchor weighing us down but a compass and guide help-

Hi Ladies,

It is hard to believe that another year of Sisterhood is behind us. The Sisterhood Board and I are extremely proud of all we have accomplished this year. The year 2023 saw the continuation of our old favorites - Fall Kick-Off Event, Book Club, Walking Group, Smith's Acres Event, Trivia Nights, Virtual Scavenger Hunt, Safe Futures Walk, Friendly Visitors Program Holiday Bags, Dinner Night, Purim Shalach Manot Fundraiser, Judaica Shop Chanukah Fair, two Mahjongg tournaments, Sisterhood Service and the End-of-Year Dinner Event.



This year also saw Sisterhood expanding with some exciting new programs. This year we added a new position to our Board - Chair of Social Justice. One of the major goals of WRJ - Women of Reform Judaism is to live and support the values of Reform Judaism. Social Justice Chair, Moira Ross, organized a "Get Out the Vote Event" in the fall and an "Abortion and Reproductive Rights Forum" in November. Both events were well attended and very well received. Moira is planning an event for fall 2023 that will deal with the importance of local School Board Elections, particularly in the area of the banning of books in our libraries and public schools. We also expanded our Mitzvah Projects this year. Sisterhood funded and implemented a project to beautify the grounds at Safe Futures on Jay Street in New London. In early May, Karen Rosenberg, Cecile Feldman,

and I visited Safe Futures to view the grounds and take pictures in order to assess the amount of garden space and what plants we would need. We decided to start by purchasing special plants at Smith's Acres to











fill two large planters in front of the Safe Futures office. Cecile and Barry planted them that day. On May 28, Cecile and Barry Feldman, Norma Hollandersky, Karen Rosenberg, Sue Fornara, Armi Rowe, Jen Zettler, her daughter Gabby and her mother spent the entire morning at Safe Futures planting all the bushes, flowers, and shrubs. There is even a small vegetable garden for the residents to cultivate. This will be an ongoing project with seasonal clean-ups and replanting until the gardens are well-established.

Next year, Sisterhood will also be working with the Jewish Federation to assemble bags of menstrual hygiene products to be distributed as part of "The Dignity Grows Project". You will remember that Sisterhood donated \$1,000 to JFEC to fund this effort.

This year, we also welcomed Jennifer Zettler to the Board as Membership Chair. It is always our goal to involve as many women of Temple Emanu-El and other Jewish women of Southeastern Connecticut as possible in Sisterhood. Jennifer will chair our fall Membership Drive and work throughout the year to recruit new members and encourage former members to return to us. Jennifer and the Board are hoping to



July 26 7:00 PM class, 8:15 Tisha B'Av service (Both in-person as well as Zoom)

Preceded by a final session of Tzadik V'ra Lo – Why Do Good People Suffer class, to which all are invited

How could it be that people are so distant from one another, from the Earth from which we grow, and from the BREATH OF LIFE that breathes us? "How could it be," ("Eichah" in Hebrew,) is the question that starts the book called Eichah in Hebrew, Lamentations in English, that is the core of the Tisha B'Av ritual, in addition to fasting. This is a holiday about distance, or, in more traditional language, "exile." How could it be that we have suffered (and imposed) the wars and

suffering that we have? And how could it be, as the tradition teaches, that the Messiah will be born on this day of commemoration of destruction? Is it true that honestly facing the suffering of the past will birth a more just and peaceful future? Such is the promise.

At 8:15, we'll read and chant the book of Eichah – some English, some Hebrew – along with other readings and songs that connect the ancient lamentation to our own experience.

Everyone is also invited to come to the final session of our adult ed class that also asked "how could it be" – how could it be that good people suffer? This final session will focus on Hassidic teachings, including a teaching from Rebbe Nachman on the role of Tisha B'Av fasting in the turning from division to peace. The class will start at 7.
