Rabbi's Message -Marc Ekstrand

Friends,

The new year 5784 has arrived. It was very good to see so many of you at our services for

the High Holy Days, whether you attended in person or virtually. There are many to thank for making the High Holy Days so beautiful. I can't do proper justice to expressing thanks to everyone in the small amount of space this article allows. However, I want to thank my colleague, our Hazzan, Sherry Barnes. Sherry's fingerprints are all over every aspect of planning and conducting our services and programs. From what I have heard from you, I sense that these High Holy Days were meaningful to you. I know I speak for all of us in expressing gratitude to Sherry for beautifully uplifting our prayers.

Each High Holy Days, I have an opportunity to address you about important topics through my sermons. On Yom Kippur, I spoke to you about the situation in Israel. Many of my colleagues across the country also addressed their congregations about the crisis. I have had the opportunity to watch a few of their sermons, and I hope that you will also take time. I point out two sermons for special note from Rabbi Angela Buchdahl, Senior Rabbi at Central Synagogue in New York, and Rabbi Sharon Brous, Senior Rabbi/Founder at ikar in Los Angeles. You can easily find their sermons by searching on YouTube. These women are two extraordinary leaders of the progressive American Jewish community.

It may be hard to listen to these sermons, but I feel that it is essential that we all do. As I said in my Yom Kippur sermon, we need Israel, and Israel needs us. External forces have constantly threat-

ened Israel, but internal fractures now threaten it. The Diaspora always has to deal with antisemitism, but now we are experiencing an alarming rise in antisemitism that is more threatening and violent. Israel and the American Jewish community need each other now more than ever. Prayers and hope are important, but deep learning, frank conversation, investment, and actions are even more critical.

Over the next few months, I will work with a dedicated few of you to create more opportunities for us to learn about and discuss what is happening in Israel from multiple perspectives. I have already heard from some of you that you would like to go on a congregational trip to Israel soon. I sincerely hope we can plan and take such a trip. I think it is essential that we see and feel first-hand both the points of tension and opportunities for pluralistic flourishing in our homeland. We need to pull closer to Israel.

We also need to pull closer to each other at Temple Emanu-El. One of the lovely things about the High Holy Days is seeing so many of you at the Temple at the same time. We always seem to pull together for the holidays. Let's not wait until next Rosh Hashanah. Keep an eye on the calendar and website for new programs, classes, dinners, and other opportunities. Let's not lose this beautiful sense of togetherness.




